The Centre for Integrated Mountain Studies has been established to promote research and innovation among teachers and students, with a focus on the Pabbar Valley and the surrounding mountainous areas of Shimla District. This center aims to encourage locally based research that emphasizes culture, social dynamics, scientific inquiry, and indigenous knowledge. 2. The B.Voc program, established in 2021-22, offers specializations in Retail Management and Hospitality and Tourism, with 40 seats per course for 2023-24. The curriculum focuses on industry-relevant skills, professional development, hands-on experience, and global perspectives. Both programs bridge academic knowledge and industry needs, preparing graduates to excel in their respective fields with essential managerial and entrepreneurial competencies.

The college offers three self-financed courses: BCA, BBA, and PGDCA, aimed at providing quality, skill-based education, particularly to rural, semi-rural, and socio-economically disadvantaged students. BCA was established in 2009, PGDCA in 2011, and BBA in 2019. Current enrollment is 24, 28, and 35 students in the 1st, 3rd, and 5th semesters of BCA, totaling 87 students. PGDCA has 27 students, while BBA has 47 students across its 1st, 3rd, and 5th semesters. The primary objective of these courses is to offer job-oriented education and create employment opportunities through campus and off-campus placements in both public and private sectors.

Apart from this the college is also organizing various short term skill based certificate courses for the session 2023-24.
